## COOLIDGE ELECTION ASSURES FINANCIAL WORLD STABILITY

*Prominent Local Merchants Optimistic Because Of Republican Victory.*

Returns from Tuesday's elections show that Calvin Coolidge and Charles G. Dawes were elected president and vice-president, respectively, on the Republican ticket by a large plurality, and the complexion of both houses is positively republican.

President Coolidge carried New York state by a plurality approaching 1,000,000, but Governor Smith has been elected over Theodore Roosevelt.

The Philippine Legislature passed a resolution congratulating President Calvin Coolidge for his reelection and conveying to him the wishes of the Filipino people for his future success.

The resolution reiterated the plea of the Filipinos for complete independence.

Senate President Quezon stated that he was not surprised at the result of the election, adding that he had nothing more to say about it as he had already said all in his recent speech, at the Grand Opera House.

Senator José A. Clarin, chairman of the committee on metropolitan relations, said that he hoped America will give the Filipinos something better than the Fairfield Bill; but that, between an American and a Filipino governor general, he would prefer the latter.

Washington, November 5.—John W. Davis defeated Democratic candidate for President of the United States, today extended congratulation to President Coolidge upon the sweeping victory of the Republican ticket.

WASHINGTON, November 3.—It was reported officially to the State Department today that the Persian

government had executed Said Husien, the ringleader of the band that murdered Robert W. Imbrie, American consul at Teheran, last July. Another man also was executed. The sentence were carried out after the American government insisted that the two should receive the extreme penalty. The decision of the Persian cabinet was to commute the sentences.

LOS ANGELES, November 3.—It is believed that the pneumonia plague now raging in the Mexican quarter here was started by ground squirrels and spread by rats. An extensive annihilation campaign has been planned. The deaths included M. B. Rulla, a priest at the historic Plaza church, who went about the infected quarter aiding the dying.

MARION, ORIO, November 3.—Mrs. Warren G. Harding, widow of the late president, is critically ill from kidney trouble.

The St. Tomas football aggregation trounced the U. P. squad yesterday afternoon at the St. Paul grounds, score 1-0. The game was played in conjunction with the anniversary canonization of Sto. Tomas, founder of the University of Santo Tomas. Two more games remain to be played.

But, U. P. basket-ball team defeated S. T. U. five, score 38-25.

The municipality of Cavite will celebrate a three days feast from November 8 to November 10, inclusive, in honor of the Virgin of Porta Vaga, the patron saint of the town. Special features on the program are fireworks, athletic games and religious services.

Dimas Angcog, last of the Colorum leader, was captured last Sunday, according to a constabulary report from Surigao. Constabulary authorities believe that Colorum activities in Min-

danao have been suppressed, there being no more leaders at large.

The La Salle football team won the championship of football league backed by the Catholic colleges of the city. With the victory goes the trophy donated by Sto. Tomas University. The San Beda squad took second place while San Paul was third.

Sunday afternoon Sto. Tomas handled the Nomads a 2 to 1 beating on the latter's ground. A return game is scheduled for Thursday at the San Paul College grounds.

The new submarines, S-36, S-37, S-38, S-39, S-40 and S-41, accompanied by the mother ship, Canopus, arrived at the Cavite Navy Yard at 8:45 o'clock last night, according to information given out at the Navy Yard. The boats came here from Guam, completing their journey from America to relieve the old subs which recently left her for America to be thoroughly overhauled and be given a new assignment.

Additional submarines of the newest type of the United States Navy, the S-42, S-43, S-44 and S-45, are en route to Manila, accompanied by the mother ship Beaver. These boats are reported to be at Honolulu and will arrive here later.

A new radio license for limited public service to handle nothing but foreign business and ship to shore business when the vessels are outside the territorial waters of the Philippines, was issued yesterday to the Radio Corporation of the Philippines, Inc., by Director Topacio of the bureau of posts. With this license good for a year, the corporation is allowed to install and operate the limited public service radio station. Recently a license to operate a broadcasting station was also issued to this same corporation.
