## General Assembly again rejects Peking's Admission to U. N.

United Nations – The Gene-ral Assembly has refused to give China's seat in the United Na-tions to the Peking communist regime.

As it has done repeatedly at past sessions, the assembly on November 28 rejected a move to recognize Peking as the only

lawful representative of China at the United Nations and to expel the Republic of China.

A draft resolution to that effect. sponsored by Albania and ten other countries - was defeated by a vote of 58 to 45, with 17 abstentions.


4. Propose som : amend.nents to the Constitution and By-Laws of the College of Business Ad-ministration; and

#### Johnson Reports U.S. Tariff Cuts Pending

Washington - President John-son will issue soon a proclama-tion to make the initial phase of U.S. tariff reductions stemming from the Kennedy Round nego-tiations effective on January 1, 1968. The cuts are to take in five senic stars

1968. The cuts are to take in five equal stages. Mr. Johnson disclosed his in-tention in a statement that ac-companied his report to Congress on the "Kennedy Round." mego-tiations, carried out at Geneva, involved tariff concessions on about 40,000 million dollars' worth of world trade Key elements were cuts of about 50 per cent on a broad range of industrial goods and cuts ranging from 30 per cent to 50 per cent on others; agricultural concessions; a world grains arrangement; non-tariff agricultural concessions, a world grains arrangement; non-tariff liberalizations, including an anti-dumping measure, and assistance to developing countries.

Felix Facatabella has hatched up the idea of dividing the premier province and is therefore readying a bill for the opening of next January's Congress with the intents and pur-poses of going thru the 'partitioning' as intended into three (3) frag-mentary parts, namely: 1) the province of Camarines Sur retaining the two congressional districts, 2) the province of West Camarines with one congressional district. # Senator Padilla Soands A Warning

LP Executive Vice-President Senator Ambrosio Padilla was the guest speaker of the regular weekly intering (December 8) of the Manila Bay Breakfrst Club.


Senator Padilla started his extemporaneous speech by a grim warning that there is a new luc-rative profession, which does not rative profession, which does not need high school instruction nor need high school instruction nor college education; much less gov-ernment board examination, and that is the utilization of "armed goons". He recounted particular incidents covered by telegrams, letters and affidavits of many LP leaders, specially in the provinces of llocos Sur and Catanduanes, wherein candidates of the Nacio-raliza Patty in power have acwherein candidates of the Nacio-nalista Party in power have ac-tively used "goons and guns" with the support of PC officers to subvert and frustrate the po-pular will. He expressed the hope, however, that the Armed Forces, particularly the PC, will

live up to the high traditions o the military in our democratic set-up of Government. democratic

Senator Padilla said that the Senator Padilla said that the opposition should cooperate with the administration in the solution of many complex and perplex-ing problems of the country, among them high prices, produc-tion, employment, education, etc. He added, however, that another more fundamental problem has been added, namely, the main-tenance of peace and order "free, honest and orderly elections" as provided in the Constitution.

Liverfluke is endemic in seve-

Liverfluke is endemic in seve-ral areas of the province. A sur-vey two years ago in Irosin, one of the endemic areas, showed that of the carabaos tested in one barrio, 27 were found to have liverfluke infection. BAI sent here a team to sur-vey the extent of liverfluke infec-tation as well as to treat infected animals. However, lack of funds prevented the team from making such headway, considering that the parasitic disease "is not easy to control and treatment alone of infected animals is not enough, since in endemic areas where the snail hosts abound, infection is constant and continuous." According to BAI, liverfluke has spread out into many pock-ets of endemnicity on account of the irrigation system which serves as arteries for the dissemination of the snail intermediate basts. A proposal to establish a re-search and training center on liverfluke in Sorsogon under the auspices of the Food and Agri-culture Organization has not yet materialized.
