"BIG SHOTS" WITH OVERDUE ACCOUNTS IN BUREAU OF LANDS

List Includes Gen. Aguinaldo, Legislators, And Department Secretaries

IF you, Mr. Juan de la Cruz, owe the government some money on taxes or some other obligations, better brace up and settle it as soon as possible. Don't think that because the government is rich it is more considerate to its debtors and that it can afford to wait at your pleasure or until you get the cash. You may just wake up one fine morning to see the sheriff confiscating your properties, or to receive, like this writer, a letter which reads more or less like this: "Your property has been forefeited to the government for non-payment of taxes and penalties as indicated above x x x x.

It is altogether different of course if you are an influential guy, a big shot. In that case you can rest at ease, assured that no authority would dare come along to grab your properties without your consent. You will now and then receive letters reminding you of your obligations, but you can easily write back a nice reply invoking the hard times and asking for extension of time to pay. If you think what we say here is not true, take a look at the list we are publishing herewith.

By way of explanation on some of the personalities included therein. Foremost of them all, in personal greatness and in amount of obligations long overdue to the government, is General Aguinaldo. Do you remember how the old general was pressed for payment of his accounts some years ago when he crossed swords with President Quezon? Of course you do. Have you heard of any similar official action taken lately on the same question? No of course. He is now in tune with the

majority faction, you know, and that's that.

On the other hand vou must have read in the papers how Commissioner Osias' salary was ordered confiscated recently to satisfy his pending obligations to the government. There was no politics in that however. It is only a coincidence that Commissioner Csias is a "pro"

As you will see in the list below the debts of these high government officials are many years overdue. But no serious efforts were made to effect their collections until Insular Auditor Jones assumed his position some months ago. Auditor Jones is not hardhearted; he knows how tight almost everybody finds himself these days, but he cannot escape the responsibility of protecting the public coffers. In the opinion of Mr. Jones it will be for the good of the debtorofficials themselves that their accounts be settled one way or another. "I don't think they are hapny with all these obligations pending against them," he said.

In enforcing the collection of those accounts. Auditor Jones has adopted a "consistent, aggressive, intelligent and realistic" policy. By consistent is meant a continuous pressing for payment; by aggresive, the witholding or confiscation of salaries of debtor-officials when circumstances demand; by intelligent, a judicious consideration of the of-ficial's situation, as his financial condition, his investments on properties purchased from and mortgaged to the government; and by realistic, considering whether tak-
