



Dr. Primitiva Demandante

There are about a dozen Filipino physician-surgeons who are practicing medicine in the United States, outside of those who are working in the States and private hospitals. Of one of them is Dr. Primitiva Demandante, a Filipino woman.

Dr. Demandante graduated at the University of Michigan Medical School in 1942. Immediately after she obtained her medical degree she worked at the Women's Hospital at Philadelphia, Penn., then later she studied under Dr. Joseph DeLee of Chicago Maternity Center.

In August of 1943, Dr. Demandante took the California State Board Medical examination. The woman doctor passed the California examination. Now she is practicing her medical profession at Wilmington, California. Americans as well as Filipinos and other nationalities are steadily flow-(Continued on Page 5)

PHILIPPINE DELEGATION CHAIRMAN HOPES FOR "ONE WORLD" OF CULTURE

Mistrust between nations is the greatest threat to the concept of "one world", Senator Proceso Sebastian, chairman of the Philippines delegation to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

Senator Sebastian proposed that to "help dispel the mistrust which complicates international relations, we propose the gradual adoption by all nations of a common medium of writing—at least for official purposes, he said.

"We also will propose publication of international newspaper, international radio broadcasts and exchange of students between universities of different nations.

"Above all, we want to show the world that small nations are willing to cooperate to create 'one world' from the standpoints of education, science and culture."

Members of the delegation that will leave for Paris are Francisco Ortega, speaker pro tem of the Philippine House of Representatives; Senator Salipada Pendatum, Dr. Gabriel Manalac, chairman of the National committee on Education, and Dr. Encarnacion Alzona, professor at the University of the Philippines.



America must be ready at all times in the future because she will be on the spot.

The next aggressor will recognize her as the chief stumbling block to world conquest in two world wars passed. He will predicate all his plans on knocking America out first. He will believe he may be able to crush us before we can get ready to fight. We are just simpletons if we do not take cognizance of these facts and govern ourselves accordingly.

The late Theodore Roosevelt, ex-president of the United States often urged, "Speak softly but carry a big stick!"

George Washington advised us to, "Have a citizen-militia force of a sufficient size and strength to be respectable in the eyes of our friends and fearful in the eyes of those who might otherwise become our enemies."

Both of these great Americans had grasped an essential fact—peace without rower is a pipe dream!

We must also bear in mind, too, that war has become a business of specialists. Weapons have become fearfully complex. It takes months of time to train a raw boy to operate a gun turret in a Liberator bomber; to use a bazooka; to fire artillerv; to drive tanks, to fly planes; to handle machine guns. When we are suddenly attacked, we will not have time to mobilze to train. We will only have time to mobilize to fight. The Universal Military Training Program will pile up for us a lot of critical time that will be precious to us in the hour of national need.



NOW THE AMERICAN LEGION SPEAKS

In appraising the merits of the Universal Military Training plan for the United States, advocated by the American Legion, it is well to adjust our thinking to grim new developments and facts.

For great number of years Americans have looked upon the Atlantic and Pacific oceans as our own God-given natural defense barriers against all foreign attacks. We have also looked upon the British navy in conjunction with our own to supplement those natural defenses. But things have changed suddenly.

World War II has been a laboratory for the development of the science of modern warfare. It has been too good a laboratory.

From it, have come war planes flying faster than sound, robot bombs, rocket planes, electronics, amphibious operations, all of which even in their present infancy, already have literally stripped America of her defensive armor—the oceans, hte mountains and the deserts. In the next war there will be no natural barriers anywhere in the world to bar military operations.

In the next war it will be possible to bombard cities across the ocean by radar and electronic controlled artillery, robot bombs or rocket planes. Vast armies will be transported in giant aerial troop carriers. Speed such as we have not even dreamed of will mark attacks..

We know these things are coming because that is the way they are shaping up the world today.

We must also accept the facts that the wars will come again. History continues to repeat itself. In the face of this knowledge we, as a nation, cannot and must not stick our heads into the sand in the naive belief that if by effort we blind ourselves to approaching danger, it will not come to us.

Our responsibility is to appraise all these conditions realistically. When we rate the sobering facts at their grim value, only one conclusion is possible.




PRESIDENT ROXAS REVEALS



PHILIPPINE DAMAGE CLAIMS TO BE ACCEPTED





TYPHOON KILLS 260 PERSONS

IN THE PHILIPPINES

MANILA. — Presidential Secretary Emilio Abello yesterday reported 260 urban deaths in a disastrous typhoon which struck the Isobela Plain of Negros Island, November 12, and unofficial estimate placed the total as high as 500.

No deaths of American personnel were reported.

The Manila Bulletin said at least 500 persons were missing and feared drowncd, as heavy floods followed the terrific winds. Some villages were demolished.

Many sectors of the Isabela Plain remained under water yesterday.

MARINES CLEARED BY

FILIPINO INQUIRY

MANILA, Nov. 17 — The presidential palace today published a report by Representative Ramon Magsaysay supporting Filipino charges of manhandling by United States Marine guards at Olongapo Naval Base but stating that "these were isolated cases, not following any set pattern."

The representative, who conducted an investigation, had found three Filipino civilians who said they were handled roughly by the Marines but that they had not brought it to the attention of American authorities.


18,000 FILIPINOS DIE

And on earth peace: goodwill toward men!

THANKSGIVING WITH GOD

November 28th is set aside here in the United States of America by the proplamation of President Truman as a day of Thanksgiving. The proclamation includes that there will be appropriate peremony and that the flags be displayed in all public places.

The most appropriate is the church. That is the place of the true Thanksgiving. There should be reading of the Holy Scriptures concerning the care of God to His children, singing of hymns, prayers and sermon on the significance of the day. EDITORIAL

The great majority of Filipinos in the United States are coming back to paganism. They do not attend church! Their wives are as bad. Few children would attend if you pick them up with a car or taxi. The love of God is not supreme anymore in their hearts. They have gone too tar in the worldly things and they are forever lost. It seems there is no hope for their redemption.

They only strive to attend to the church services if they need something. That is if they ask a favor from the preacher or help from the few that are in the church but after that they forget. That is not the normal Christianity.

Several years ago here in Shcramento Filipinos had a funeral and they invited a Catholic priest to preach the funeral sermon. The priest looked first at the good crowd and then began to talk. The priest told them that "you have forgotten to attend to the Church of your mothers and fathers . . . the Roman Catholic Church." The priest instead of preaching a funeral sermon, for the dead Filipino he devoted time in scolding them. These people came to a Protestant minister telling him of the scolding of the priest in the funeral parlor. That was the last time I heard the priest was called to deliver a funeral oration.

The Protestant minister told a dozen Filipinos who came and reported the funeral story connected with the priest that the "Father was doing fine."

In meeting of the United Nations at Lake Success, New York, the other week, there was no prayer. That is the question that every loving people and people who do not want war to study. There should be prayer offered first before the meeting starts. Protestant clergy, catholic priest, a rabbi or even a Mohamadan should offer prayer first. They all look on God as Father. They all pray, and the meeting should start with prayer, just like when Congress of the United States meets they always open with a prayer of the chaplain . . . a Christian prayer.
