Above: the old enlisted men's village in Camp Murphy Below the old camp chapel. In the places of both buildings today are modern structures.













Above is the II MA headquarters at Camp Vicente Lim, Laguna. Below is the IV MA headquarters in Cagayan de Oro City.
