Ans.: Yes. With the signing by President Marcos of the Rodrigo - Diokno Poll Registration Bill, the registration of voters under the new list is now extended until October 15, 1967. The author has not yet gotten hold of a copy of the full text of the law. Once he does, he will eause the publication in this paper of the neutinent provisions of the law. The author urges and appeals to all qualified voters to now RUSH UP to register AT THEIR THEIR TOPPORTUNITY AND WITHOUT DELAY in their respective city and municipal election registrars offices on any day, Monday through Sunday. All Comelee offices are now open during office hours dealy, Monday to Sunday. Those whose applications are still leoking, especially aregistered after said period are guited after said period. complain and have them corrected immediately white the precinct books of voters are not yet sealed; and all those who are already certain to yote, to use and exert all their rafluence to have all their rafluence to the register NOW. Philippines bae set Dole Philippines has set up a pineapple eannery in Potomolok, Cotabate about 30 kilometers from the southern scaport of General Bantos. Under the new expansion scheme of the country, it will develop Filipino-ewned lands into pineapple-plantations rather than lease large tracts from the government as in the pasts

The president of the com-pany is stated to be turned over to Gerenimo Z. Velas-eo, vice president, to re-place Hubbard who is return-ing to the United States

According to Hubbard's report which sovers a fveyear projection, sineapple will be the largest export of the Philippines after two years. It is now ranked No. 10 among the nation's exports. Dole Philippines is expected to produce 200.000 metric tons of pineapple annually after two years.

At this production rate, the Philippines could expect to earn some 557 million in (foreign exchange from 1967 to 1972.

Taxes to be realized, mostly from the 30 per cent withholding tax applicable to the foreign exchange borrowings of the project is rowings of the project, is expected to amount to P26 million.
