the provinces, the judge said the likelihood is that they would all be elected to the convention, should the proposed amendment be approved.

⁴ Thus, he said, the calling of such constitutional convention would be a "pure waste of multi-million pesos of public funds." Congress might as well approve the necessary constitutional amendments by resolution of both houses, thereby obviating the necessity of a convention for the same purpose, the judge pointed out. - Vic Foz in Manila Times, Sect. 27, 1967.

WHAT MAKES A CITY

Population, industry, commerce, and agriculture must reach a high stage of development and production at and around a community to make it a city. The modern city is a complicated affair. At times it is "a large body of people living in a re-'latively small area." A comprehensive definition of the modern city must indicate that it is a social. political, legal and economic unit all rolled into one. It is a concentrated body of population possessing some significant social characteristics, chartered as a municipal corporation, having its own system of local government carrying on multifarious economic enterprises and pursuing an elaborate program of social adjustment and amelioration. - By Prof. William B.
