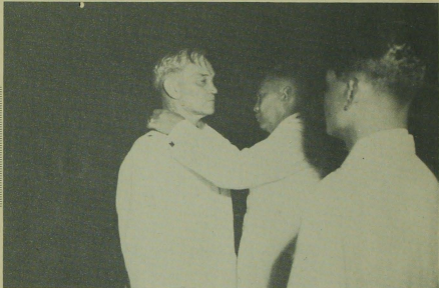

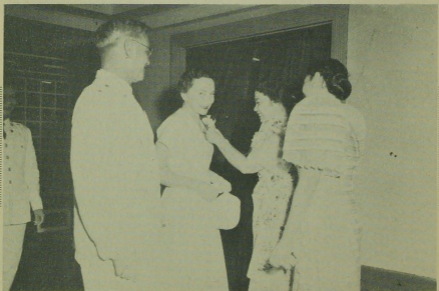

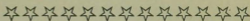

FOR A SLIGHTLY CORREGIDOR—Illustration appearing above is that of the proposed resthouse and tower to be erected in Corregidor, last rampart of Fil-American forces in the gallant defense of the Philippines in World War II. Tourists have long wanted to view the historic spots in the island fortress, but lack of facilities like resthouse has worked as a discouragement. The National Shrines Commission has laid out plans for conversion of the island into a shrine and tourist attraction. A big job to do justice to the epic history of the island in the last war, execution of plans has the resthouse and tower as only a part of the project.

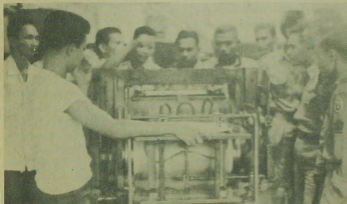

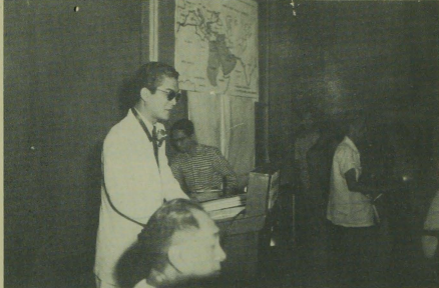
