Rev. Fr. Rector has obtained the permission of His Grace, Msgr. Cesar Ma. Guerrero, D.D., Auxiliary Bishop of Manila, for a First Friday exposition of the Blessed Sacrament at the Ateneo Chapel every month. Three hours will be granted successively to each department to form the guard of honor in the following order: Grade School, High School, College (including Liberal Arts, Commerce and Chemistry), and the College of Law, at night. This will be conducted through the Ateneo Sodality, in conjunction with the devotions of the League of the Sacred Heart.

Change

One of the foremost sections of the Ateneo Sodality of the Immaculate Conception, the Third and Fourth Year High School day scholars and half-boarders, has taken a forward step, changing its name from "St. John Berchmans" to "St. Joseph's Sodality," choosing the Patron of the Universal Church as its model for subdued greatness and nobility of character.

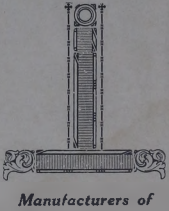

His wife Alcestis alone is willing to give her life for his ransom. Apollo does Admetus this good turn to repay the Pherean king's kindness when Apollo had been condemned by Jupiter to serve in a mortal's house. Accordingly Alcestis parts from her husband, her children, and her household. In the midst of tears and wailing, just after Death has claimed his own, Hercules, the most stalwart of mortals, but not yet a demigod, arrives. Struck by the signs of woe in the household, he proposes to pass on to another friend's house, but Admetus would not hear of such a breach of hospitality. He is served his dinner in a distant chamber, unaware of the real state of things. Later Hercules extracts from his attendant the real cause of the family grief. Almost overwhelmed with his friend for such over-strained delicacy, he hurries to render him such "yeoman" service. His dinner, the strongest of mankind could perform. Alcestis has been laid in her grave; the mourners have come back to the palace; and Death, deeming himself secure from interruption, is making ready for a ghoulish feast on her corpse. He has already reckoned with the guest. He finds himself in the dilemma of foregoing his prey or being strangled at the hands of Hercules. He then permits his irresistible antagonist to restore the devoted wife to the arms of her disconsolate husband.

Lavish Sets

The Moderator of the Ateneo Players' Guild has rewritten certain soliloquies, for adaptation. Among these are the main speech of Agamemnon, the words of Thanatos, the king of the Nether World; and Alcestis' speech, where she speaks of her death. Fr. Fullam S. J. has likewise introduced several settings of his own. Besides the single original exterior setting, he has brought into the play several others. The play opens with the Pastoral scene, one of his innovations. It depicts an outdoor scene, like the wayside shrines in the country. The second scene of the first act is set in the original Greek exterior of the Palace of Admetus. The second act includes the repetition of the first scene and two other of the innovations, the interior of the Palace and the Burial Scene. The third act, Scene the first, is set in the Guest chamber of the Palace. The second scene shows one of the most elegant of Father Fullam's creations, the Nether World. The scene will consist of a ramp coming down from the back of the stage, depicting the distance in the descent to the lower regions. The stage will be full of smoke and mist, with ghouls flying around. In this scene will be the interior of the Palace, in the Shrine of Apollo, where Francisco B. Romualdez, as the Greek god, will hold a pose for a stretch of from fifteen to twenty minutes, and where Alcestis will make her offering to Apollo.

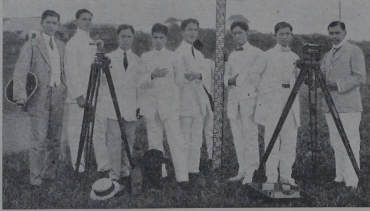

Nat'l Fiber Firm Pays Up Capital To Date

Ateneo Grads Officers
Of Corporation

According to the incorporation papers acted upon by the board of directors of the National Development Company, the National Fiber Corporation has paid to date a capital of P1,255,500, out of the subscribed capital stock of P2,500,000. The papers have already been forwarded to President Quezon for his approval.

Prominent among the officers of the National Fiber Firm are Blue and White alumni. The organizers and members of the directorial board are Secretary of Finance Antonio de las Alas, Mayor Juan Posadas, Jr., Juan Elizalde, Dr. Manuel L. Roxas, Gregorio Anonas, manager of the National Development Company and Ex-Representative Felipe Estrella as treasurer. They are also the incorporators and directors of the National Warehouse Corporation, another government subsidized organization.

The purposes for the establishment of this corporation are to buy, sell, export, deal in, barter, exchange, and handle abaca and other fibers as well as its by-products; to lease, own, charter, operate or hold, subject to existing laws, trucks, railway lines, ships and other means of transportation, warehouses, presses and structures of every nature and any kind for storage, baling, handling and the sale of abaca and other fibers and their by-products.

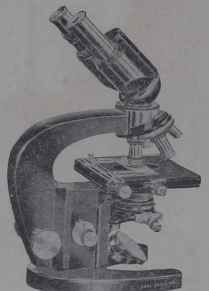

This special form of devotion will surely obtain for the sodality the necessary help it requires for the accomplishment of its various aims. This devotion of the Ateneans for the Most Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary will merit for them the grace of God.

THEATRICAL UBIQUITY

It's spring. Birds are a-twitter. The Canteen is dead as Hector, alas, but sweetness in human nature waxeth strong like a mule's kick. Mr. Raul Manglapus has joined the cast of Father Lord's play. Such devotion to the cause of good histrionics naturally has the effect of making us hysterically happy. What intangible compensations there are to balance the sacrifice in time, energy and swing recitals, surely our beneficent friend as well as the Junior Auxiliary both know. The dears.

THANNY GOES TO TOWN

Spring thoughts aside, it is becoming increasingly evident that Mr. Manglapus is the possessor of an acting gift of definite magnitude and versatility. From Horatio to Larry McGinley, via Cyrano and the tennis player in "Saturday Night"—this is a non-stop record telling an illuminating, colorful story. And now, Death in Euripides' Alcestis.

The Thanatos is something of a revelation. A glimpse of fantasy that should provide a cue to a cast which we suspect might not yet have assimilated the mood of poetic unreality, the spell-binding contemplation of Life and Death's mystery, without which the appealing beauty of grandeur and beauty of "Alcestis" will be as dust in the desert air.

To be fair, Thanatos is a pretty obvious characterization, requiring not too much of ingenuity or resourcefulness. Yet, the actor's success in realizing the role's potentialities is not to be underrated.

SO MUCH FOR THE GREEK

Being extremists in a way, at one time we would have been a cinch for voting that our actors inflict themselves on Manila's long-suffering public with masks, high boots and the rest of the real McCoy. Fortunately, our dictatorial instincts have not yet reached their full flowering; otherwise it would have been a Greek straw that broke the camel's back.

The Rubicon crossed, we should not stop at half-measures in the matter of revamping Alcestis. Not amiss, for instance, would be a little more grand acting, specially on the pantomimic side. The Chorus during a rehearsal retained throughout a stiffness and detachment which, to their complete stupefaction, might yet make Sandmen out of them. This is terrible, because we cherish a particular affection for what the Chorus stands for—the fine, sensitive lye string which echoes and incorporates the emotional progress of the play.

As a matter of fact, the whole cast should take a hint and make generous additions to their store of workable gestures and postures. Visual interpretation in costume dramas is traditionally on a more extravagant scale than in contemporary plays.

CHAPEL ETIQUETTE

It would seem surprising indeed that we should call the attention of Ateneo students to their conduct in the chapel, at Mass especially. But personal observations have revealed a rather deplorable ignorance of what we may conveniently term "chapel etiquette." For example, some have the tendency to fall asleep, or day-dream, or gossip during Mass. Others simply have to sit there, still sitting down or rest their heads against the back of the pew while kneeling down. Again, some find excuses to leave the chapel at the most improper time. Others have an inferiority complex and choose to crowd at the back of the chapel. But perhaps, the greatest breach of chapel etiquette we have noticed among some Ateneo students is the tendency to sit down after the Consecration and during Communion time, when the Blessed Sacrament is exposed on the Altar.

When we consider that the Ateneo is a Catholic College, that religion is a very important part of the daily curriculum, that the Jesuit Fathers are making sacrifices in order to develop a select body of Filipino Catholics, who not only understand the solid philosophy behind Catholicism, but also practise their religion — when we consider all these things—it is very hard to explain the improper conduct of some in the presence of God in the Blessed Sacrament. Is it because the Ateneo is a complete failure as regards the religious instruction of its students? This cannot be, because the Ateneo has turned out splendid examples of Catholic gentlemen, who know how to behave in the presence of their Sacramental Lord, who use their prayer books at mass and who always carry their rosary in their pockets. Or is it not because some have the intellectual brilliance to grasp purely academic subjects and yet have not enough will power to live up to their obligations as Catholics?

Big things start from little things, so the saying goes. Perhaps, laughing at a discordant singer during Mass is not a very serious thing. Perhaps, to some, sitting down in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament is not so great a breach of etiquette as slouching in the presence of the President of the Philippines. Perhaps, day-dreaming, gossiping or looking around during Mass, instead of reading the prayer-book or saying the rosary, is not so essential to sincere Catholicism. And yet, these seemingly insignificant breaches of chapel etiquette reveal utter ignorance of the beautiful truths and mysteries of our Faith. They reveal a rather unstable Catholicism (that will surely rot and fall when removed from the nurturing atmosphere of the Ateneo.

"You sound like a priest," some may tell us. "Do you want everybody to be a priest or a monk?" Of course not. Proper observance of chapel etiquette does not necessarily mean asceticism or the like. It is but the proper effect of practical, living Catholicism!

Are you an Ateneo student? If you are, then you have no excuse under the sun to be a half-hearted Catholic. Remember that Ateneo Spirit does not mean loyalty to the basketball team alone. Ateneo Spirit has a greater meaning. It signifies a prime and intense loyalty to God, even in the little things of this life.
