NUN REBUKES LONELY PRIESTS

Roman Catholic priests who plead the loneliness of their lives as a reason for the church to abolish celibacy were sharply rebuked by a former nun.

Miss Monica Baldwin, who gained world attention with her book, "I leap over the wall," describing her experiences on returning to the world from an enclosed convent, wrote to the editor of "The Times",

"As a failed nun, I have experienced many of the difficulties complained of by those who feel the hardships of a dedicated life. May I suggest that such troubles are almost invariably due to self-seeking? No prisst worth his salt should today have time for londiness."

At another point in her letter, Baldwin asks sharply:

"How do these self-pitying persons, who mean on televisions and in wellpoid press articles, spend their free time to complain of loneliness its oreveal the poverty of one's interior life...for the infallible temedy for loneliness is to each lange self-presoccupation for an intense interior life. I speak from experience."

Baldwin is a cousin of Britain's one-time prime minister, Stanley Baldwin.
