

NEWS OF THE WEEK

PARIS, November 8.—Although the French government has decided to discontinue the legislation at the Vatican, it will retain a semi-official observer there similar to the system followed by the United States.

PARIS, November 8.—Vicente Blasco Ibañez, noted Spanish author, announced today that he had chartered two airplane to bombard Spain shortly after November 20, with a pamphlet denouncing King Alphonso and the military dictator. The first edition of the Ibañez pamphlets numbered 2,000,000 copies. The author said he expected great results.

MADRID, November 8.—The military directorate today issued a statement dealing with the apparent revolutionary happenings in Spain caused by anarchists from France, syndicalists in Spain. About thirty persons who came from France, the statement says, engaged in a serious battle with the police at Vera, Navarro. One policeman was killed and one civilian was killed and one wounded. Six were arrested. Later twenty two more were rounded up and four killed. All of them had leaflets calling for a revolution in Spain.

MANAGUA, NICARAGUA, November 8.—Earthquakes followed by rain for the last 24 hours have caused great alarm. It is feared the volcano Santiago, near Masava, which has been more or less dormant for a long time, is in eruption again.

MARION, OHIO, November 9.—Mrs. Warren G. Harding who has been ill from kidney trouble for several weeks, underwent an operation last night. She withstood the operation with but little shock, and according to her physicians manifested her usual courage. It is hoped the operation will afford temporary relief.

A bulletin says that while her general condition is not immediately critical, it causes the

great anxiety on account of the condition of her heart.

NEW YORK, November 8.—The Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce of America announced today a new world record for seaplane speed. The record was established at Langley Field by aviators of the army air service on November 1. The fliers were Victor E. Bertrian and George C. Macdonald who flew 1,000 kilometers (620 miles) in six hours and six minutes or an average of 102 miles per hour. The previous record was 74 miles per hour.

NEW YORK, November 8.—A radio wave flashed across the ocean from England today set off a powder flash light which clicked a camera and made a photograph of the Grand Central Palace.

MARION, O., November 11.—The physician's bulletin today regarding Mrs. Warren G. Harding says she had a poor night, that she feels weak and exhausted this morning and that her general condition is not so good.

A bulletin issued yesterday said she was fairly comfortable. She had maintained the gain which she had made during the previous few hours but her condition was about the same.

CAIRO, November 11.—It is reported that the Hediaz troops are advancing toward Mecca and expect to occupy the city within three weeks. The city of Mecca is now under the reign of the Moslem puritans and the Wahabis.

LOS ANGELES, November 11.—Two cases of suspected bubonic plague were under observation today near the Mexican border. Both are children.

MONTEVIDEO, November 10.—Part of the crew of the mutinous battleship, Sao Paulo, which put in here for fuel and provisions today, landed. They will be considered as political

offenders and are not liable to extradition.

The ship showed some marks from the guns at Rio Janeiro where the forts fired on her. It is reported that the ship's guns inflicted heavy damage on the forts.

It is not revealed what became of her legitimate commander. Lieutenant Cascardo, commander of the mutineers, told the authorities he intended to hand over the ship to Uruguay.

The Italian Gran Opera Company, expected to arrive here in time to open their season November 15, but delayed due to unexpected developments, will arrive in time to open November 22, according to information received yesterday.

Signor Carpi, impresario, will arrive tomorrow morning on the steamer President McKinley to make arrangements for the opening.

No change will be made in the program originally announced here regardless of the delay, according to the information received yesterday.

NEWMARK, N. J., November 10.—Charley Weinert of Newark outpointed Luis Angel Firpo last night in a twelve round no decision match, according to the opinion of the newspaper men at the ringside. Weinert outboxed Firpo in every skirmish and the South American was badly marked.
