The immediate arrest and deportation of a Chinese national was recently ordered by President Marcos for misrepresentation.

The Chief Executive ordered the deportation of William Lee, whose known address is 555 San Lodes, Malate, Manila.

Lee, who was indentified as the son of Severino By Li and Yang Yau Ho, both Chinese, misrepresented himself as an American citizen. By such deceit, he was able to convince a Filipino to accept his proposal of marriage, with the wedding subsequently set for September, 1963. But then Lee's duplicity was discovered, and the marriage was cancelled. The parents of the would be bride brought suit, seeking Lee's expulsion from the country.

After duly hearing the case, the Deportation Board found that Lee "made false statements as to his identity, citizenship, date of birth and residence." He also supplied false information on the application for a marriage license that he filled.

Lee admitted having misrepresented himself "for the purpose of winning complainant's love and affection."

The Board recommended Lee's expulsion and "thereafter to exclude him from the Philippines."

**UN Convention On  
Narcotic Drug Confirmed**

The United Nation General Assembly Convention providing for continuous international cooperation and control of narcotic drugs was confirmed recently by President Marcos.

Narcotic drugs, under this Convention, will be limited only to medical and scientific applications. It replaces existing treaties on such drugs. The President, in confirming the UN Convention on narcotic drugs, underscored the concern of his administration over the growing narcotics menace in the country, especially among students and other youths.

Recently, he issued a proclamation imposing rigid curbs on a number of drugs which he defined as habit-forming.

The list of 52 drugs covered by the proclamation was transmitted to the Philippines by the World Health Organisation.

The strict control imposed by the President is also in accordance with the provisions of the Narcotic Drugs Law. Its purpose is to prevent or minimize use of addiction-forming or addiction sustaining drugs and thus put more teeth in the drive against drug addiction.

In a parallel move to strengthen the law, a move which has a direct bearing on the administration's peace and order drive, the President also recently directed the NBI to beef up its narcotics bureau.

The President also instructed Col. Jolly Bugarin, NBI chief, to adopt a more effective program in the drive against illegal traffic in narcotics.

Narcotics addiction, among others, is a determinant factor in the increase of crime in the country, the President said in his directive.

**Returning Philcag Troops To be Utilized In Civic Action Work**

Returning Philippine Civic Action troops from South Vietnam will be utilized for civic action, purposes, on orders of General Segundo Velasco, AFP chief of staff. Operations in Central Luzon will receive an added boost with the utilization of these officers and enlisted men, as well as the 1st Philippine Civic Action Group who will be completing one year tour of duty in Vietnam.

Most of the non-combatants troops are doctors, nurse, and civic action technicians, and the experience gained by these Philippine Contingents and Philip-

pine Civic Action Group who served in Vietnam can be put to effective use.

Philcag personnel rendered medical, dental, surgical, engineering and other civic action services, risking their lives in their missions to help the Vietnamese peasants.

In 26 weeks, some 600 hectares of jungle have been cleared and a network of roads and security outposts constructed.

In the medical-dental field of activities alone, the Philippine civic action workers have treated for free over 240, 622 Vietnamese patients as of July 24 this year.

**Report Of The Present Status Of The P.N.R. Its Defects, Reason For Such Its Role In Our Economy And Program Of Improvement Now Being Undertaken. As Per Interview Conducted By The Writer At The P.N.R. Control Office, Tutuban, Manila**

The Philippine National Railway is very far from what it should be, but it is much better than it used to be, thanks to the improvement instituted by the new management. That is if emphatic statement made by the General Manager, Col. Nick Jimenez when interviewed at the P.N.R. Control Office at Tutuban Station, Manila recently. The Control Office is a new addition to the existing offices of the P.N.R. aimed at maximizing the utilization of otherwise idle box cars and other equipment throughout the entire railway lines.

Under the present setup,

the Manager went further, the P.N.R. can not really give the service and economy that the public expects due to so many factors. Among them he said, is the lack of government support and the public's lack of cooperation in the care of equipment especially in the passenger coaches. While other means of transportation like the Airlines for instance, the government maintains airports, the shipping lines got the wharf and piers the Bus Companies, the government maintains roads and bridges. Whereas the National Railway Line maintains its

own rail line, bridges, security system, stations and so many other essentials in the operation of the railroad.

Asked why the P.N.R. is almost always in the red, Col. Jimenez said that the above-mentioned reasons plus many others and the over two million pesos monthly payroll for the over 7,000 employees almost amount to what the P.N.R. is today. As to the cry of inefficiency of the rail line, the Manager asked for more understanding from the public on behalf of the over 7,000 employees and their families. God willing, with the present trend of improvement now being instituted, efficiency will come, despite the shortage of motor cars, freight cars of all kinds and coaches for passengers which are much less than before the war, the P.N.R. is doing all it can, short of miracle. Taking into consideration the increase of volume of traffic and using less equipment and the same rails that it had been using for the last sixty five years, the P.N.R. should be given kudos and encouragement. Freight cars before the war were 1,844 today we only have 1,097. Passenger cars in service are only 53 and 27 are alternately under repair.

Again on the public understanding and cooperation, the General Manager asked the traveling public to be more conscious too of their duty to safeguard the interest of the properties of the P.N.R. especially its equipment and the passenger coaches which are always subjected to vandalism and osavahem. Every now and then newly installed equipment and furnishings disappear.

The manager said further that it is very easy for the rail line to make money if profit is the main consideration in the operation, but the public must know that the P.N.R. has a duty to perform and that is the National Economy. The rail line has to serve the people that helps develop the economy of the Country by providing means of transportation to the people from small and out of place stations and towns. Without the railway line the economic development of out of way places would be rustic and stagnant. Asked further to elaborate on this point the Manager said that to stop a train alone in a small station means hundreds of pesos loss in terms of wear and tear of spare parts. Yet small stations have to be maintained and serviced and employees have to be taken in regardless of the insignificant financial return that the Company realizes from these points. The Company has to lose if it expects to help develop our national economy and help also the public and its over 7,000 employees, said Col. Jimenez.

Comparing our own railway to that of the British railway, the Manager said that the British has to lose 134 million pounds a year in order to support its own railway. Comparing that loss to our railway, ours is just a drop in the bucket, yet we are operating on almost antiquated and obsolete equipment and rails, which other foreign railway lines should have long ago discarded.

The P.N.R. is one of the worst in the world because of the lack of government financial support yet accidentwise we are one of the

smallest, according to records and statistics gathered by the manager recently, in his studies on railways abroad.

As to the Cagayan and the Sorsogon lines, Manager Jimenez said that although the project is a losing proposition it has to go thru because it is the duty of the government to help the people in the two regions develop their economy as well as their well-being. Even after fifty years of operation the Manager said, the capital to be invested in the projects can not be taken back. The Cagayan project will soon get on its way again because its financing is coming. But the Sorsogon line has to wait pending the final study by the Japanese financiers. It will take about six months to survey and it is estimated that it will also take five years to complete the project which will cost 160 million pesos. Already 60% of the right of way have been purchased according to the Manager.

As to the clamor of some sectors to sell the railway company to private enterprises the Manager said that no private sector will ever consider buying the Company if it has to consider giving back to the stockholders their money that they invested at the same time giving the same service to the public that the P.N.R. now is giving.

So, the Manager said that it is almost criminal to sell if we expect to have the same, the return of investment and the service that the P.N.R. is now giving to the public. Maybe it is better for a private sector to put up another line of their own if they desire to help develop our economy.

For the present the bulk of freight carried by the railway line to points of destination comes in the following order as per volume: Flour, Lumber, Cement, Sugar, Agricultural Products and Manufactured goods. Passengers who bought tickets at station center exceed the 11 million mark as of 1966 records of operation. While the P.N.R. realized revenue from these commodities the help it makes in the movement of those goods amount to generating economic opportunities and generate job opportunities as well.

## Questions and Answers on the New Voter Registration

Ques: Since Sept. 15 has passed, can voters still register under the new list? Nuntor Magdaang, Lössu, Albay.

Ans.: Yes. With the signing by President Marcos of the Rodrigo - Diokno Poll Registration Bill, the registration of voters under the new list is now extended until October 15, 1967. The author has not yet gotten hold of a copy of the full text of the law. Once he does, he will cause the publication in this paper of the pertinent provisions of the law. The author urges and appeals to all qualified voters to now RUSH UP to register AT THEIR FIRST OPPORTUNITY AND WITHOUT DELAY in their respective city and municipal election registrars' offices on any day, Monday through Sunday. All Comelec offices are now open during office hours daily, Monday to Sunday. Those whose applications are still lacking, especially those without successfully developed photographs, to complete and have their applications validated or approved by their Election Registration Boards; those who have already received their IDs or who had registered but are not very sure if they could vote, to check in the list of validated and approved applications in their election registrars' offices if they are included among those voters sure to vote; those who have complaints with respect to mistakes or discrepancies in their application forms, IDs, precinct

number, address, etc., to complain and have them corrected immediately while the precinct books of voters are not yet sealed; and all those who are already certain to vote, to use and exert all their influence to have all the other people qualified but are not yet registered under the new list, to register NOW, AT ONCE, IMMEDIATELY AND AT THEIR FIRST OPPORTUNITY—to assure almost all, qualified voters of their previous right of suffrage some November 14, 1967.

Ques: Is it true that if you do not register now under the new list, you might not be able to vote in the 1969 election? Elpidio Ruis, Caramoan, Camarines Sur.

Ans.: The law provides: "Any person who fails to register within sixty days after having acquired the qualifications of a voter or is registered after said period shall not be qualified to vote in the election immediately following his registration. For purposes of the nineteen hundred sixty-seven elections, however, any person who is a qualified voter may register any time before the sixty-day period preceding the date of said election." (2nd sentence of paragraph 2, Section 8, R.A. 3588, as amended). With the approval of the Rodrigo Diokno Poll Registration Bill, the sixty-day period preceding the date of said election is deemed amended as before the thirty-day period.

## FM Informed On Filipinized Dole Philippines

The Filipinization of Dole Philippines, a subsidiary of the world's largest pineapple packing company, was effected with the taking over of most of the administrative and financial function of the company by Filipinos, President Marcos was informed recently.

The President was apprised of this revolutionary management move by Howard Hubbard, president of Dole Philippines, who said that eventually there will be total Filipino management of the company "starting from the top."

Hubbard called recently on the President to submit a progress report on Dole's operations in Mindanao.

Hubbard also informed the President that in connance with the offer made by Castle and Cooke, Inc., mother company of Dole, investments in the corporation has already exceeded \$35 million and an additional \$7 million is projected within the next two years under the Filipino management.

Dole Philippines has set up a pineapple cannery in Polomolok, Cotabato about 30 kilometers from the southern seaport of General Santos. Under the new expansion scheme of the country, it will develop Filipino-owned lands into pineapple plantations rather than lease large tracts from the government as in the past.

The president of the company is slated to be turned over to Geronimo Z. Velasco, vice president, to replace Hubbard who is returning to the United States soon.

According to Hubbard's report which covers a five-year projection, pineapples will be the largest export of the Philippines after two years. It is now ranked No. 10 among the nation's exports. Dole Philippines is expected to produce 200,000 metric tons of pineapple annually after two years.


At this production rate, the Philippines could expect to earn some \$57 million in foreign exchange from 1967 to 1972.

Taxes to be realized, mostly from the 30 per cent withholding tax applicable to the foreign exchange borrowings of the project, is expected to amount to P28 million.
